## What does it mean?

Some useful words are explained below

### Beauty related terminology

A specialised vocabulary used within the beauty related industries

### Body language

Non-verbal communication, including gestures, facial expressions, eye contact and postures.



### Botox

Botox is one brand of botulinum toxin type A. This is a neurotoxin that blocks nerve signals to muscles, stopping or limiting their movement.

### Chemical skin peeling

This treatment involves an application of a chemical solution to the skin.



### Communication

The giving, receiving and responding to information.

### Dermal fillers

These add volume to the face and, depending on the type of filler and the depth injected, fine lines can be smoothed, and deep lines filled. They can also be used to plump up areas such as the lips.



### ICT

Stands for information and communication technologies, such as a smart board.

### Injectables

Procedures that are administered by syringe.

### Micro-pigmentation

A highly skilled treatment where pigment is inserted below the epidermis for cosmetic and/or corrective enhancement.

### Otoplasty

The surgical repair, restoration or alteration of the external part of the ear.

### Rhinoplasty

The technical name for a 'nose job'.

### Rhytidectomy

The technical name for a face lift.

### Tooth whitening

A procedure to whiten and brighten the teeth.



#### Revision tip

Remember that many innovations have lots of different forms. For example, hair extensions involve human hair, synthetic hair, extensions worn for an extended period, and short-term clip-ins.

Find out which visual aids will best illustrate the information you are preparing to present. For example, charts and graphs are a better way of presenting figures than having them written in words or given verbally.



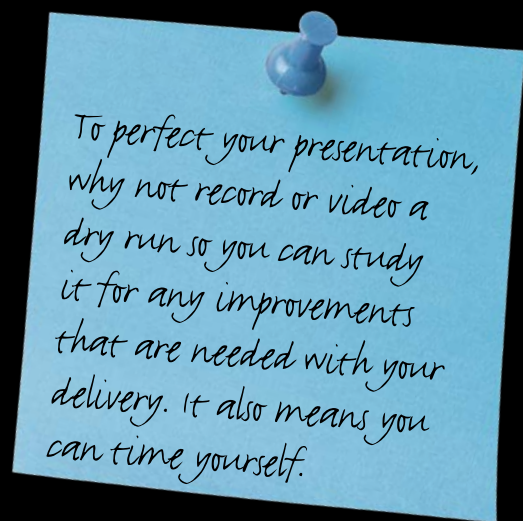
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*Remember there is always the risk of side effects following any treatment. Clearly explain what they are during the consultation process and ask the client to contact you in the event of side effects occurring.*

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# Technique



At the beginning of the presentation, check to make sure you can be heard by everybody in the audience. Remember to vary the tone of your voice otherwise it will sound boring and monotonous.

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*Always be honest with clients and clearly explain the limitations of the treatment to enable the client to make an informed decision. In this way you will generate a good reputation and establish a good client base.*

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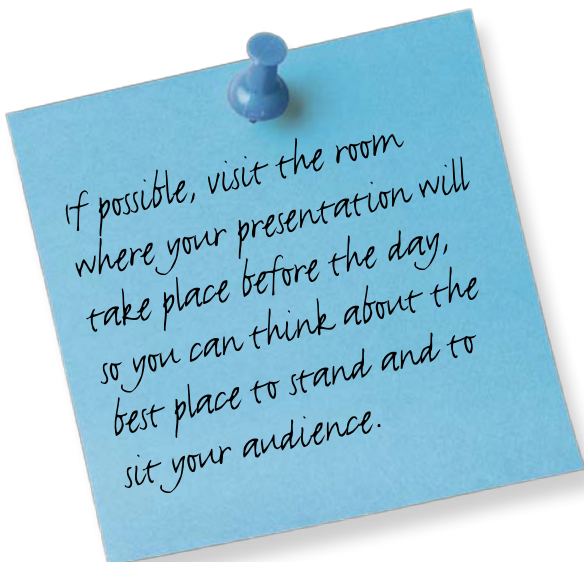
