To access the higher marks in the band, the response must cover a limited range of considerations that should be taken into account when working on a film set. Band 2 (4-6 marks) The response covers some of the main considerations to take into account when planning and researching. Some discussion showing an appropriate level of understanding into the historical hair, and make-up considerations of the performer needs. Knowledge of the environments that they may be working in. Some discussion made into film set etiquette and other professionals they may work with. Decisions are supported and justified. To access higher marks in the band candidates must include aspects of Marlene Dietrich and working on a film set with understanding of continuity and health and safety on set. Band 3 (7-9 marks) A thorough and well-prepared response that covers a broad range of considerations with relevant links to all technical aspects necessary for working on a film set based on the life of Marlene Dietrich. All stages of the planning process are thoroughly explored including evidence of extensive knowledge of the hair, make-up and history of Marlene Dietrich. Decisions fully supported and justified. To access higher marks in the band candidates must discuss negotiation of payment, with discussion and understanding of script demands, shooting schedule with detailed reference to Marlene Dietrich. A basic understanding of working on a local TV news programme and a few examples have been provided of the people the make-up artist would work with. Discussion is not well developed and there is little attempt in providing reasons for choices. To access the higher marks in the band, the response must cover a limited range of considerations of camera/ HD that should be taken into account when applying make-up for a news reporter. Band 2 (4-6 marks) The response covers some of the main considerations to take into account when working on TV and a good general knowledge of the TV etiquette when working on news reporters. Some discussion on the reporter's needs and the working environment. Some planning has been made into the make-up artist kit requirements and the departments that will be liaised with. Decisions are supported and justified. To access higher marks in the band, candidates must show a good general knowledge of the type of make-up suitable for news reporters. Band 3 (7-9 marks) A thorough and well-prepared response that covers a broad range of considerations with relevant links to all technical aspects necessary for working on a news show. All stages of the planning process are thoroughly explored including evidence of extensive knowledge of the make-up requirements of the news reporters. Planning has been made into working on multiple news reporters and working with other departments on the news show. Decisions fully supported and justified. To access higher marks in the band candidates must discuss influencing factors with discussion of prospects of working on a news show.
