What does it mean?

Some useful words are explained below

Aftercare advice

Information given to the client to help with style and hair maintenance.

Client preparation

Getting the client ready for the service, including, for example, gowning the client.

Hair elasticity

An indicator of the condition of the hair's cortex and the strength of the hair: strong hair can stretch and return without damage.

Hair growth patterns

Includes double crown, widow's peak, cowlick, nape whorl, natural partings.



Features of the head and face

Includes nose, ears, high forehead, short forehead, chin, etc.



Finger-drying

Using the fingers and hands to mould, shape and lift the hair into the required style while drying.

Finishing products

Used during the dressing and finishing of the style to help maintain the effect.

Hair density

The concentration of hairs on the head. For example, a sparse head of hair has low hair density.

Hair texture

The thickness of each single hair.

Manufacturer's instructions

Explicit guidance by manufacturers or suppliers on the use of products, tools and equipment.

Personal protective equipment (PPE)

Equipment available for use in the workplace to protect you, your skin and clothes from damage, for example gloves, aprons, or overalls.

Styling products

Used to aid the drying stage, helping to protect the hair from heat.



Tools

Combs, brushes, etc used to carry out the hairdressing service.


What you must know

Revision tip


There are three basic stages to the hair growth cycle: anagen, the growth cycle of the hair, which can last from three months to several years; catagen, the stage when hair stops growing, which lasts about two weeks; and telogen, the resting stage, when the hair shrinks and separates from the papilla (becomes loose and falls out). After the telogen stage, a new anagen stage begins and the process repeats.

Make sure you don't create too much root lift in the hair; men don't generally like too much lift or volume.

The most important thing is to be very good at the scissor-over-comb technique.



When drying and styling hair, use the mirror regularly to check the development and balance of the style.
