### Evidence requirements

To achieve this unit you must practically demonstrate in your everyday work that you have met the standard for designing and creating patterns in hair. The standards cover things you must do (performance criteria), things that you must cover (range) and things that you must know.

### What you must do

Your assessor will observe your performance on at least 3 occasions, all of which must be of different patterns and 1 pattern must be over a full head.

### What you must cover

You will see key words in bold on the 'What you must do' list. For each of these, there is a range of things that you must cover. You must show that you have:

- use all the tools and equipment listed\*
- taken into account all the factors listed
- produced designs that cover the areas of the head listed
- created all the types of patterns listed
- used all the cutting techniques listed
- given advice covering all the areas listed

It is most likely evidence of your performance will be gathered from the observations made by your assessor but you may be required to produce other evidence to support your performance if your assessor has not been present.
