 (1) can be encouraged to be heard/acted upon (1) so that they feel what they say is taken seriously, this will positively affect their relationship/strengthen the relationship (1) and help to resolve any issues the child may be experiencing (1).

12 Band 1: 1 – 4 marks

The response covers a narrow range of considerations with limited reference to the implications of Tresse's and her baby's health and care. Basic discussion displaying mostly recall of knowledge and limited understanding on the different aspects of the scenario. Brief or no description of analysis and recommendations to overcome the issues faced by Tresse. Limited or no reference to sources of support or examples. Minimal justification to decisions or relating back to theories.

To access the higher marks in the band, the candidates' response will cover a broader range of considerations and show understanding of the implications to both the mother and baby.

Band 2: 5 - 8 marks

The response makes a reasonable attempt to cover a variety of considerations displaying a good level of knowledge and understanding of the implications of Tresse's, and her baby's healthcare and care. Discussion is mostly relevant and likely to be detailed in some areas more than others. Some sound analysis and recommendations to overcome the issues faced by Tresse provided with reference to a range of

Indicative content

Immediate action

- report concerns to the correct professionals within the GP practice
- contact relevant healthcare professionals e.g. urgent referral to midwifery unit due to high blood pressure and pains
- recording the incident in line with safeguarding procedures and legislation

Short term actions

- Report to a range of healthcare services and professionals that may contribute to meeting Tresse's needs, including housing, pregnancy, money, health
- The importance of carrying out a risk assessment to minimise short-term safeguarding issues with regards to both mother and baby, this could include issues relating to

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sources of support. Some justification to decisions and relating back to theories.

To access the higher marks in the band the overall discussion is presented in a clear, logical format, detailed and contains relevant justifications.

Band 3: 9-12 marks

The response is both thorough and detailed covering a variety of considerations displaying excellent breadth of knowledge and depth of understanding of the implications of Tresse's, and her baby's healthcare and care. A comprehensive discussion supported with sound recommendations to overcome the issues faced by Tresse with reference to a range of sources of support.

To access the higher marks in the band the response will be well balanced, comprehensive and the recommendations fully justified.
