Some gaps in knowledge were present but a good understanding of the topics shown. Technical terminology is used frequently, but may not always be accurate.

To access the higher marks in the band, the candidate will have linked their discussion to the injury of the dog.

Band 9 - 12

Comprehensive discussion on health and safety including equipment, the equipment selected is appropriate for the situation with a range of examples. Key points in relation to the welfare of the animals were comprehensively discussed. The candidate will have considered and applied relevant legislation to the scenario.

Thorough knowledge and understanding of the topics shown throughout. Technical terminology is used frequently and accurately.

To access the higher marks in the band, the candidate will have linked their discussion with justifications to the injury and medical requirements of the dog.
