Along with some suggestions about how to monitor the potential changes. There will be some use of specialist terms, although they may not always be used appropriately. The information is presented mostly in a structured format. Band 3: 7 - 9 marks Thorough discussion, showing a clear understanding of ecological significance and historic features, and how countryside recreation may disturb this. Along with a range of suggested monitoring techniques that could be used. Specialist terms will be used correctly and appropriately. Information will be presented in a structured format.
