7	 Answer: 1900 – British woodland resources had been declining since the Middle Ages reaching 5% of land area at this time. Start of First World War could not rely on timber imports Forestry Act – set up the Forestry Commission and gave it the responsibility for woods in England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland. Forestry Acts main policy was to rebuild and maintain strategic timber reserves as stocks were depleted by the First World War. They were given freedom to acquire and plant land due to post-war inflation this was cheap. Public concern over blanket conifers led to a change in policy from block planting of conifers to the inclusion of amenity planting – with hardwoods alongside roads and stream sides. After the Second World War restoring the forest became a priority for the Commission – planting with broadleaves, and it also saw the beginning of the research work carried out.
