Want it tomorrow? Online shopping may be bad for the environment

Wednesday 20 August

Online shopping is a common experience these days but the large number of items sent back is becoming a problem.



Most people agree that buying things from a high street shop is likely to harm the environment more than shopping online. That's because many people driving to and from shops use more petrol than one van delivering parcels.

However, a recent study shows that buying online might not help the planet as much as we think. Because customers know they can return items free of charge, they often order more than they plan to keep, such as different sizes or colours. Therefore, vans travel many extra miles to collect unwanted items. Last year, Global Post broke the record for the most deliveries in a day. The money earned by companies like Global Post is growing each year. This may be good for them, but not so good for the planet.

What can customers do?

Customers can make a difference by ordering less frequently and sending fewer items back. Buying less is best. The advice to those who want to help the planet is to think carefully about what you buy and plan ahead if possible. It's better to sign up for repeat purchases, so that sellers and delivery companies can plan delivery routes that save on petrol.


